Iowa delegation will cast ballot for Trump

JOHNSTON, Iowa — The Iowa delegation to the GOP national convention will cast its ballot for Donald Trump even though he didn't carry the state, Republican Party of Iowa Chairman Jeff Kaufmann said Friday.

Kaufmann conceded that Iowa Republicans are in "various degrees" in their support for Trump. Some are thrilled, some are accepting, and "we have people who are in the process."

The "never Trump" movement, however, is a "tiny, tiny little minority of people with large megaphones," he said.

People who "feel the need to have that internal, heartfelt, passionate conversation in front of cameras and in front of journalists (are) bent on self-promotion and could care less about our first-in-the-nation status and the integrity of our process," Kaufmann said Friday after taping Iowa Public Television's "Iowa Press" program with Iowa Democratic Party Chairwoman Andy McGuire.

Suggestions that the Iowa delegation will cast some of its votes for Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, who was the caucus winner, or some other candidate is "hypocritical ... nonsensical, and it's not going to happen," he said. "Donald Trump is our nominee."

McGuire thinks Iowa Democrats also are uniting behind the party's presumptive nominee, Hillary Clinton, and the party is stronger as a result of its competitive precinct caucus campaign.

"We had more new people than the Republicans did at the caucuses, and we have a lot of enthusiasm," McGuire said. People are getting involved because "they want to make sure we're talking about working

men and women and we're talking about equality and equal pay and minimum wage."

"So we're really talking about issues that are core to the Democratic Party, and they will really help us energize our party," McGuire said.

She played down suggestions that Clinton's supporters and those of her rival, Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, are "keeping score" in terms of which camp elected more of its members to state party posts.

Rather than identify themselves as Sanders or Clinton supporters, McGuire said Democrats are talking about "having a very progressive, inclusive party."

"I don't think there is any kind of us-against-them," she said.

Search for biological family leads to organ gift for cousin

PEORIA — Lori Orton set out to locate her biological family not knowing what she might find, or whether they would even want to speak with her.

She's always known growing up in Washington that she'd been adopted at birth from a young mother, but she had no solid information to go on to find her birth family until she found a document helping her mother move that had their names.

Even then, her journey to reconnect with her roots would be marred with complications and dead ends, and, rather unexpectedly, a chance to not just become a part of someone's life, but to save it.

"You don't get too many chances in your life to do something that really matters and really makes a difference, and to be able to show my kids that it's important to do things for other people — and to just know that I did something that matters — was something for myself," said Orton, of Pekin.

Orton's biological family history, as she discovered, was complicated. Her biological father, who had never been in a serious relationship with her biological mother, died tragically in a car accident that also claimed the life of his two children. No one in his family even knew that he had fathered another child who'd been given up for adoption.

Her biological mother also died shortly after their reunion, but despite losing both her birth parents, Orton discovered she had a large extended family in the Princeton area, many of whom knew about her and

ton fit in. While some of her family members were skeptical of her intention, for Russelburg it was clear early on that she was only looking for answers.

"She was a very open, very sweet woman, genuine to the sense that she wanted to get to know people and understand where she came from. It wasn't like she was seeking out to receive something. She had a true, genuine want to know," he said.

Russelburg's health had started to deteriorate in early 2015 as complications from diabetes put him in renal failure in the early part of 2015, about three years after they met. Once an active father to his three teen children, he was struggling just to get through the day.

"Basically it was go to work and then I was confined to a couch for the rest of the week," Russelburg said.

In December, he collapsed at work and had to be flown by Life Flight to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center, where he was told his kidneys were operating at 4 percent of their normal ca-

halls of the hospital floor within eight hours of the surgery," Russelburg said. "It's amazing how much better I felt so quickly."

Dr. Manish Gupta, a transplant surgeon with RenalCare Associates who performed the procedure, points out that many transplant patients aren't so lucky.

More than 120,000 people are waiting for some kind of life-saving organ in the United States today, he said, and the demand for organs far outpaces the supply. On average, each day 22 people will die waiting for donation.

Kidney donations, along with certain types of lung and liver donations, are unique in that they can be performed with organs from a living donor, assuming doctors can find someone who is both willing to make such a valuable donation and is medically suitable to do so.

To those that can, the long-term effects of the procedure are usually minimal, Gupta explained.

"To a previously healthy

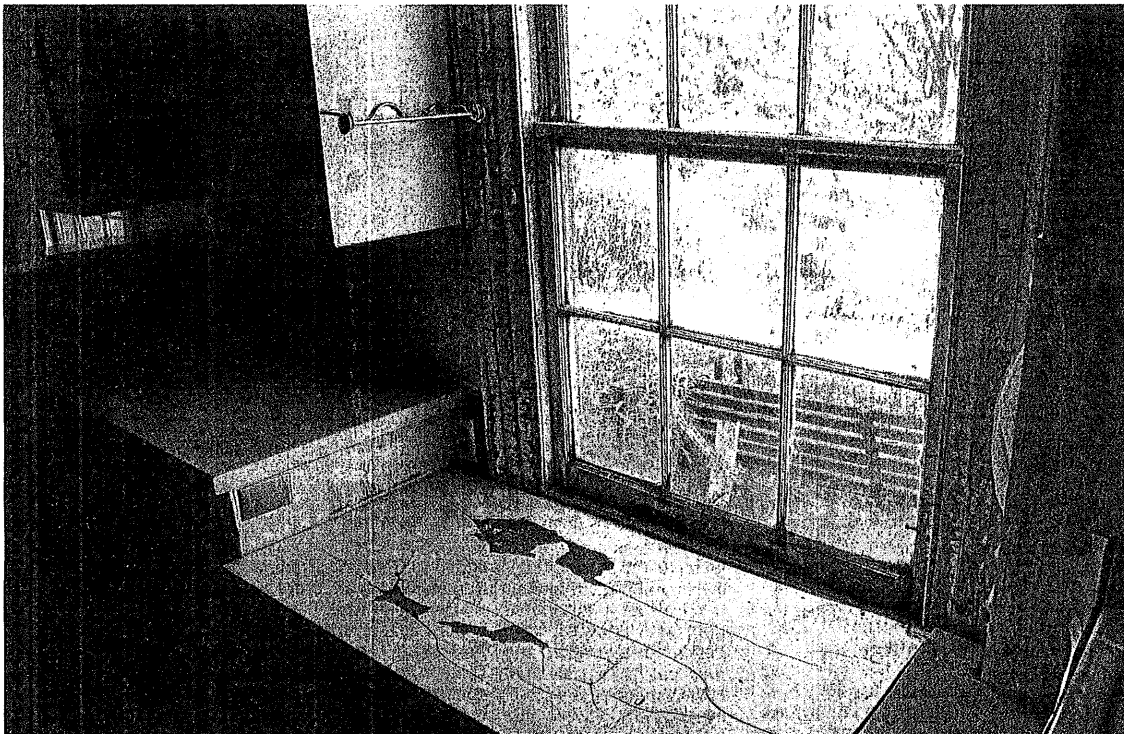

West Liberty group hoping to save landmark

One of oldest stagecoach stops in Iowa

WEST LIBERTY, Iowa — The West Liberty Heritage Foundation is raising funds to purchase one of the oldest stagecoach stops in Iowa from owners Christian and Laura Elliot.

Owner Christian Elliot said a deal has been in the works for a while now and was finally reached between the two parties and the Muscatine County Preservation Commission.

"We have been working with the West Liberty Heritage Foundation off and on for a number of years," Elliot said. "We have recently rekindled discussions regarding them purchasing

the property from us. Through meetings and other communications, we have established a selling price and Laura and I have committed to sell the property to them."

Muscatine County Historic Preservation Commission chairperson Laura Wertzbaugher thinks trying to raise the funds won't be a hindrance.

"We've had several parties and individuals step forward to give funds," Wertzbaugher said. "We'll also have promotional events so I don't anticipate fundraising being a bottleneck on the project."

Wertzbaugher also discussed the plans once they finish the first step of fundraising and obtaining ownership of the building. After these steps, the next two important steps pertain to rehabilitation and potential usage of the building.

Since the building has been standing since 1842, the building has shown wear and tear throughout the 174 years that it

Dow dives after EU vote

World economy to take hit in Brexit aftermath

Britain's vote to leave the European Union adds a heavy dose of uncertainty to a world economy that is still struggling to reach full speed years after the global financial crisis.

The most immediate pain will be felt in Britain. But economists say the ripples could be felt much farther afield.

Stocks plunged in the U.S. and worldwide Friday after Britain voted to leave the European Union. The result stunned investors, who reacted by rushing to the safety of gold and U.S. government bonds as they wondered what will come next for Britain, Europe and the global economy.

U.S. stocks gave up all their gains from earlier in the year. The Dow Jones industrial average tumbled 611.21 points, or 3.4 percent, to 17,399.86. The Standard & Poor's 500 dropped 76.02 points, or 3.6 percent, to 2,037.70. Both indexes took their biggest loss since August. The Nasdaq composite suffered its biggest loss since mid-2011, down 202.06 points, or 4.1 percent, to 4,707.98. Indexes in Europe and Asia took even larger losses.

The British vote brought a massive dose of uncertainty to financial markets, something investors loathe. Traders responded by dumping riskier assets that appeared to have the most to lose from disruptions in financial flows and trade: banks, technology companies and makers of basic materials. More shares were traded than on any day since August 2011, when Standard & Poor's downgraded the credit rating of the U.S. government during a crisis over the budget and the country's debt
