Spectrum, library offer book discussions in July

Area residents starved for signs of hope in a world filled with human and environmental loss may be interested in participating in July discussion groups, according to Heidi Swets, Spectrum Industries recycling education coordinator.

"This is an extremely uplifting and exciting book to read because it focuses on possibilities that already exist," says Heidi Swets, discussion group organizer.

"Literally hundreds of documented cases where the strategies of natural capitalism have stimulated innovations which have dramatically improved lives, restored the environment and promoted economic stability."

The discussion sessions are part of a series of follow-up events to the Natural Step trainings and presentations which took place in April of this year, sponsored by Spectrum, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, Winneshiek County, Luther College and several Decorah area businesses.

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Spectrum offers program on natural capitalism

A video featuring author and sustainability proponent Paul Hawken discussing natural capitalism will be shown at Decorah Public Library Wednesday, June 28 at 7 p.m. in the public meeting room.

Hawken is a business leader and leading architect and proponent of corporate reform with respect to ecological practices.

He has written "Growing a Business," which aired as a PBS series in 115 countries and his "Ecology of Commerce" continues to have a large impact on business and government.

He also helped found "The Natural Step" in the U.S. and internationally and advises many companies on sustainability issues.

Hawken's most recent book, "Natural Capitalism: Creating the Next Industrial Revolution," which he coauthored with Hunter and Amory Lovins of the Rocky Mountain Institute (RMI), is fast becoming a "blueprint for a new economy" in which business and environmental interests overlap.

"Natural Capital," says the RMI, "refers to the natural resources and ecosystem services that make possible all economic activity, indeed all life. These services are of immense economic value; some are literally priceless, since they have no known substitutes. Yet current business practices typically fail to take into account the value of these assets which is rising with their scarcity. As a result, natural capital is being degraded and liquidated by the wasteful use of such resources as energy, materials, water, fiber and topsoil."

The Hawken video will explain how businesses and industry, using the four interlinked principles of capitalism, can transform our view of the role of commerce in shaping out future.

Following the showing, Andy Johnson of Resource Conservation and Development for NE Iowa will share his experience as a participant in a natural capitalism seminar for Iowans, sponsored by the Iowa Department of Energy and RMI in Des Moines.
